PASTOR LARRY'S NOTES

"One nation, under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all." Do you remember reciting those words of the Pledge of Allegiance in school when you were growing up? With our present political polarization it seems we have forgotten those words. So for four Sundays during the month of June starting June 11 and leading up to the birthday of our nation in July, I will be talking about how those words relate to us as followers of Jesus Christ.

The first week, June 11, we will look at what "one nation" means in terms of loyalty as Americans versus being God's chosen representatives as Christ followers. In week two, June 18, Father's Day, we will talk about what it means for a nation to be "under God". Those words "under God" were added by Presbyterian President Dwight Eisenhower and I will talk about why they were added to our national pledge. How do we live under God in a culture that is becoming increasingly hostile toward the things of God? Week three, June 25, we will look at the idea of "indivisible". How do we as Jesus followers stand united spiritually even though we may have differences politically? Finally in week four, July 2, we will look at what "liberty and justice for all" means in a time when immigration is a hot topic. How do we, in this culture, love with grace without compromising truth?

My intention will be to address the issues we are dealing with while trying not to be partisan so that nothing is taken away from the power of the cross of Jesus Christ. We live in a great country and it is the responsibility of all of us who live here and especially Christ followers to keep it great and pass it on to the next generation. I look forward to sharing these current and interesting topics with you on Sundays, this summer. You may also watch videos of this series or read it by visiting our website: www.irvingtonpres.org.

On Wednesdays, beginning June 7 and continuing through June 28, Pastor Ken Jacobsen, a retired Presbyterian Pastor, will be teaching a course on comparative religion. Pastor Ken has been attending IPC for a while and has great insight into our struggles to effectively minister to our community. Many of our neighbors are immigrants; many come from other faiths and backgrounds. How do we talk to them? What do we say beyond "go talk to our Pastor." It starts with knowing what they believe and clearly understanding what we believe. This class will explore evangelism in the context of world religions. To understand others, we must understand our own message and background. Then we explore Hinduism and Buddhism. We will look at how they have interfaced with our Christian faith. Finally we will delve into Islam and its relationship with Christianity. Did you know that Islam teaches that Jesus is the Son of God who was born of the Virgin Mary and will come again leading God's armies at the day of Judgement? So, what is the difference between Islam and Christianity and why is it important? Come to the McKowen Room at 7 pm and participate in this exciting class.

Invite your friends and neighbors to join us for worship on Sundays at 10:00 am. Encourage them to stay and mingle at the fellowship hour that will be held on the patio during the summer.

I am on study leave June 4-10, and will take a summer course titled "Preaching the Resurrection" at Yale Divinity in Connecticut. Pastor Martha will preach in my absence and serve communion.

SESSION NEWS & NOTES - Mustapha Baksh

Session held its regular meeting on May 16. We began with prayer for God's guidance as we continue to work together for His glory. The first half hour was dedicated to worship as we sang, praised the Lord and had communion. Session prayed for healing and blessings of the many members in the congregation who are ill. Pastor Larry then took us through a reading and discussion of ACTS 3:1-14.

The minutes of the April 18 regular session meeting and a special online meeting on May 3, to approve a Session sponsored picnic on May 28 were approved. In addition, Session approved a motion for Pastor's vacation schedule in 2017 and to hold Communion Sunday on September 10, rather than the first weekend when Pastor is on vacation.

The Clerk and Assistant Clerk shared a brief report on the Presbytery meeting that they attended on May 7. The next Presbytery meeting is scheduled for September 9, at First Newark Presbyterian.

Pastor's report indicated that for 2017 and excluding Palm Sunday and Easter, we are averaging 70 adults in worship and seven children in class. Even though several of our long-term members were unable to attend worship because of illness, it is important to note that on the first Sunday of May, attendance was the same as in 2014, with many new faces in the congregation. The next new member seminar is scheduled for Sunday June 11. Pastor Martha will preach on Sunday June 4 when Pastor is on study leave. There were visits and communion to seven members who could not attend church and Pastor Larry's next sermon series titled "Under God" commences on June 11.

The financial report for May was not available but finance was able to prepare an expense summary of 2017vs2016 that highlighted the areas that account for the 2017 deficit.

Elder Pat Jeffries shared the plan for Sunday May 28. Worship will be outdoors followed by a picnic. During worship, there will be a short celebration of Harry Berkheimer who served in WW 11. Church Alive Ministry is actively involved in all facets of the planning. Session members who will be in town, were requested to help with erecting the tent and cooking. About 700 mailings were done in a particular geographic area of the church and there are expectations for a good turnout.

The Nominating Committee is beginning to work on getting new members for Deacons. Because of the size of our congregation it is usually difficult to fill all the open Deacon positions. The Clerk shared a plan on enhancing the role of the Deacons going forward. There was a trifold and a power point presentation delineating how Session can enhance the role of the Deacons. Members were requested to review the recommendation and come prepared to discuss at the next meeting.

In an attempt to define a marketing name for the church that would make us more attractive to anyone searching for a church on the internet and one that is more easily identified with our community, there was a presentation and discussions on how we should proceed. Members were requested to review the presentation, make recommendations and be prepared to discuss at the next meeting.

The meeting closed in group prayer at 9:05 pm, thanking the Lord for our time together, prayers for teamwork in Session and for the many activities that are planned in the next few months.

Praying for South Sudan - Patti Boyland

The Republic of South Sudan is a new country—it was formed in 2011. At that time, there was great

jubilation and hope. Its people had previously been under the oppressive Islamic government of Sudan, to the north. South Sudan's population is largely black African and there are many Christians there. However, very soon after independence, tribal warfare broke out in South Sudan and has continued off and on for many years.

The country has oil and rich agricultural land, but feuding, fighting, killing, looting, and burning of villages has destroyed the economy; and much of the

population is displaced and faces famine. Tens of thousands have been killed. Over one million people have fled their homes, most of them women and children. Almost 300,000 people are at risk of dying of hunger.

Because South Sudan is not a major player in world politics, or a threat to us in the United States,



we rarely hear about it in the news. Yet our brothers and sisters are suffering terribly.

What can a person do? We can give money, through organizations such as World Vision. But God has given us a powerful tool - <u>prayer</u>. In James 5:16b we read, "The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective." And we are righteous in God's eyes through what Christ has done for us!

For about seven years a group of women at our church have met on the second Thursday of every month in the McKowen Room to pray for South



Sudan. We are associated with "She Is Safe", a Christian organization devoted to encouraging and helping our sisters and their children in



perilous situations. Through She Is Safe, we are in contact with a number of women in South Sudan who love Jesus, are desirous to spread the Gospel and, of course, are struggling to keep their families safe and feed them in the very dangerous situation

in South Sudan.



MY TESTIMONY

One of the most effective tools we have for sharing our faith is the story of how Jesus Christ gave us eternal life and how He has enriched our lives. The Apostle John wrote, "We proclaim to you what we have seen and heard" (1 John. 1:3), testifying about his journey and relationship to Jesus Christ. In this, the next to last of a series, an IPC member shares this journey from his journal. The content is minimally edited.

"Two thousand years later I came along! I could see nothing but the blackness. I needed something. I had a dynamo within me. fighting to get out. I had to have help. I asked Him; He came to me and gave me Enlightenment. He gave me everlasting life. Now, I am that mustard seed. He goes on. That's the miracle of the mustard seed parable. Such a beautiful gift on the fifth day!

Friday the sixth day. Things are pleasant. But the Spirit is not with me. Oh no! Where are you Jesus? I fall to my knees beside the bed and ask His forgiveness. What have I done? Where is the Spirit? At work, I ask my Christian friends about the Spirit. I've lost Him. What have I done? My friend Orville explains that everything that happens is for a reason; there is a reason for this. But what? Andy, working at the Santa Cruz test base, calls me. I had called him the day before to explain all the beautiful things that was happening to me, But he was too busy to talk. In explaining the Enlightenment, the Spirit is revived. But there still was a problem. He goes on to say that the reason he and Rita went to Tahoe with us the previous year was sort of tit-for-tat. If we went to the Couples Conference, they would go to Tahoe. We'll do your thing if you will do ours. But he hadn't really wanted to go to Tahoe. He explained he had always been caught up in games and he was a little afraid of gambling. I thought about this and realized I just couldn't see Jesus pulling the Slot Machine handles; and with more thinking realized that I have never enjoyed gambling and I never won. It was just something to do. Also, the night before, our friends Maynard and Treasure had been over. I had been trying to explain how I had found Jesus and also trying to talk them into the Bus Trip to Tahoe. I couldn't see the difference between Jesus and gambling.

I opened the Bible and saw "gambling". Looking again I saw it was "grumbling" not gambling. In place of "grumbling" I got: "and there was much "gambling" among the multitudes; concerning Him some were saying, 'He is a good man', others were saying, 'No, on the contrary, He leads the multitudes astray." I put myself in place of "He" and realized the vast difference between Jesus and gambling. All was forgiven. How stupid not to see.

But I still had a problem; how was I going to Tahoe and perform His works? Finally I realized how. Maynard and Treasure were having trouble communicating with each other. He was so caught up with providing that he wasn't seeing the beauty of his family. His family is perfect. He and Treasure had lived a perfect life and had inspired this goodness into their children. Somehow, with Jesus' help, I would spread His Word to them; to help them see the beauty in each other; to help them regain the communication that they once had; and maybe "I" won't do anything, maybe just being with them to share their joy in regaining this communication. Jesus is with all of us; He works through us; He will help them.

Where am I today, seventeen days knowing Jesus? The bubbling Spirit is not with me always, but much of the time. I see the beauty in this world. I continue to serve Him. I pray to Him daily. I try to instill His thoughts into my children. I love Him." ... to be continued.
